## Report on the Workshop on Takri Script at HP State Museum

Date: 23rd February 2025

A report on the participation of the History Department in the workshop on Takri Script titled "Takri Script: Rediscovery and Revival – Bridging the Past and Future", which was held at the Himachal Pradesh State Museum on 22nd February 2025. The workshop was jointly organized by Ghonrokta Charitable & Educational Trust, Matiana, in collaboration with the National Mission for Manuscripts, Ministry of Culture, Government of India.

A group of **25 students** from the History Department of **Government College Sanjauli** actively participated in this educational event. The students were accompanied by the faculty members of the History Department, including **Mr. Vikram Bhardwaj** and **Mr. Chander Verma**. The workshop aimed to explore the historical significance, technical aspects, and ongoing efforts for the revival of the **Takri script**, an ancient script historically used in the Western Himalayan region.

The workshop provided an enriching learning experience for the students. Experts from the **National Mission for Manuscripts** and the **Ghonrokta Charitable & Educational Trust** delivered comprehensive lectures and interactive sessions on the **evolution**, **structure**, **and deciphering techniques** of the Takri script. Throughout the day, the students exhibited keen interest and actively participated in discussions. The interactive nature of the workshop fostered a deeper understanding of the **technicalities of the script**, its historical applications, and contemporary efforts to safeguard it. The event concluded with a **certificate distribution** acknowledging the students' enthusiastic participation.

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## Report on the Educational Visit to Dorje Drak Monastery, Shimla

Date: 10th March 2025
