POs:

Analytic Outlook:

COs:

BA -I

1. Introduction to Philosophy (PHIL-A-101CC)

- Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:
- Write effective essays that demonstrate knowledge of the course material related to the well-formulated essay thesis and that analyze the material in a clear, systematic, original, thoughtful, and well-developed manner.
- Deliberate, in written or oral form, in a manner that indicates comprehension of a philosophical concept, issue, or perspective.

2. Indian Philosophy – 1 (PHIL-A-102CC)

- This course is concerned with the different views of traditional Indian philosophical school.
- It is concerned with the orthodox and heterodox school, the theory of causation, liberation, law of karma, epistemology, metaphysics, and soul theory.

3. Indian Philosophy – 2 (PHIL-A-203CC)

- This course introduces ethical principles and concepts which will develop moral thinking.
- It is concerned with the orthodox school, the theories of Metaphysics, Ethics, Logic, Epistemology and etc.

4. Indian Philosophy -3 (PHIL-A-204CC)

- It is concerned with the heterodox school, the theories of Metaphysics, Ethics, Logic, Epistemology and etc.
- To enable the students understand how the fundamental philosophical issues were discussed in these schools.

5. Introduction to Logic (A-205 SEC)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify the underlying logical structure of written sentences and arguments.
- Identify and analyze the logical structure of arguments.

6. Ethics - 1 (PHIL-A-206 SEC)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate understanding of major ethical theories and problems in the Western Tradition through written and oral discussion.
- Identify, analyze, discuss, and explain the significance of moral/ethical issues.
- Understand key ethical theories and to apply those theories to contemporary moral and social issues.
- Evaluate the similarities and differences between ethical systems in written form.
- Identify and explain the main ethical or moral issues that arise in everyday life, including friendship, trust, love, fidelity, promises, dignity, honor, respect, tolerance, acceptance, vulnerability, intimacy, etc.

BA - III

7. Western Philosophy- 1 (PHIL-A-309DSE)

- Understand and be able to discuss major philosophical problems in the Western Tradition.
- Assess arguments and philosophical perspectives using critical reasoning.
- Express complex thoughts logically and coherently.
- The student can explore the important philosophical theories like theories of truth, knowledge, empiricism and etc.
- Apply knowledge of philosophical perspectives, logic, and critical reasoning to develop his/her own opinions regarding philosophical problems and issues.

8. Western Philosophy-2 (PHIL -A-310 DSE)

- This paper concentrates on the fundamental notions of knowledge and truth.
- The student can explore the important philosophical theories like Realism, Idealism, Materialism, Phenomenalism, Logical Positivism, Existentialism, the concepts of cause and substance etc. It helps to develop a strong knowledge base of philosophical enquiry and criticism.

9. Ethics -2 (PHIL-A-307 SEC)

- The student can explore the important philosophical theories like intuitionism, theory of categorical imperative, theory of virtue, freedom of will and etc.

- They will be able to read and comprehend philosophical texts, classical or contemporary, in the area of ethics.

10. Applied Bio-Ethics (PHIL -A-308 SEC)

- The objective of this course is the application of ethical rules and principles which can apply for well being of the society.
- This course designed for the theory of applied ethics, abortion, suicide/ euthanasia, ecology, theory of punishment, free will and determinism and etc.
